Although I only taught for two or three hours on Friday mornings, I thoroughly enjoyed my years at the Ulpana and still have relationships with quite a few of the students, including one who is now my next door neighbor. Dr. Blau and Beryl created a very special spirit in the school. It was not only a place where

in her welcoming remarks, "NJOP's mission is the renewal of Iewish life for thousands

learning was taken seriously, but also a place where one could gain a love for Torah and learning, and have fun at the same time. Such institutions are rare indeed.

So, when I decided to start NJOP in the summer of 1987, I knew that I needed someone special to help me make it work. It was Rabbi Nochum Stilerman who mentioned to me that Beryl might be available, and to this very day I am deeply indebted to him for that information. Beryl and I had to start literally from scratch. Rabbi Jay Marcus of the Genesis Foundation and Joseph (Yogi) Loshinsky of the Western Wall Foundation were kind enough to let us share their small offices in 475 Fifth Avenue. Within eight months we had grown so rapidly that there was no room for the original occupants.

In early 1988, just a few months after we started, Rabbi Mordechai Reich joined our staff as the first Program Director. We launched our first Hebrew Reading campaign, and 5,000 people responded! We were blown away!

However, would these same participants respond to something more Jewish, like Basic Judaism? 3,000 of the original Hebrew Reading students enrolled! We knew immediately that we were on to something big. Beryl was there setting up our new offices at 485 Fifth Avenue and hiring additional staff, and additional staff, and additional staff.

I guess the rest is history.

So while I get the honor, it is Beryl who deserves the credit, and Sam as well, who used to come in to help us with our bookkeeping and accounting whenever necessary. As Beryl is today, she has been throughout the past 17 years, a devoted servant of Al-mighty G-d and His people. For Beryl there is

no time clock, she is ready to serve 24/7. And even today, in her semi-retirement, she is still on top of everything, albeit from a distance, but no less effectively than before.

When G-d looked down from heaven and saw the needs of His people, He knew that someone special was needed to help bring them back. So He sent His extraordinary emissary, Beryl Levenson, to help create our very special organization.

Beryl, may it be G-d's will that the Divine Presence continues to dwell in the works of your hands and in every one of your endeavors.

PASSOVER ACROSS AMERICA

This year, in an effort to help North American Jewry celebrate the Passover holiday in a more meaningful way, the National Jewish Outreach Program introduced a "Passover Across America" initiative. Nineteen synagogues in sixteen cities offered Passover Across America Seders as part of a pilot program. Additionally, in the days and weeks before the holiday, synagogues and Jewish centers across North America offered either a Model Seder or NJOP's new Pre-Passover Workshop or both, as a way to prepare for Passover.

"Since its inception, NJOP's goal has been to work with synagogues to enable them to reach out more effectively to the less affiliated Jews in their communities to give them a taste of Jewish tradition," said Rabbi Ephraim Z. Buchwald, founder and director of NJOP. "By creating easy-to-implement, appealing programs, we help synagogues forge these connections. As the numbers show, Passover Across America, which was conceived and sponsored by our dear and generous friend, Mr. Sam Domb, was a phenomenal success in this regard."

The nineteen rabbis who hosted the pilot program and who benefitted from NJOP's programming materials and subsidized local advertising, found, on the whole, that they succeeded in drawing a wide range of non-members who were looking for a place to celebrate Passover.

At the renowned Ohev Shalom Talmud Torah Congregation in Washington, D.C., also known as "The National Synagogue," nearly 300 people--90% of whom had never been to the synagogue before--joined Rabbi Shmuel Herzfeld for the first seder. "It was a remarkable evening of everybody joining together," the rabbi said. "At our Passover ACROSS AMERICA Seder, we had people from all walks of life and socio-economic strata...People came in as strangers and left as a community. People loved the experience so much, that some expressed interest in joining our shul, while others wanted to learn about more of our programs and services."

Similarly, Rabbi Shaanon Gelman, of the Community Kollel in Boca Raton, Florida, reported that of the 50 people who attended the Passover Across America Seder, 90% were new faces.

Each synagogue that hosted a PASSOVER ACROSS AMERICA Seder received copies of the newly published NJOP Haggadah, which includes text in Hebrew, English and transliterated Hebrew, as well as a step-by-step leader's guide filled with explanations, stories and unique seder insights. In addition, each synagogue received a training video and financial support to assist their marketing and advertising efforts.

"Tve run many communal seders," said Rabbi Elie Weinstock of Congregation

Kehilath Jeshurun in Manhattan, "but the Passover Across America component and the NJOP materials made the experience even better, and brought in different people. We had more than 150 people at our seder, ranging from newborn babies to senior citizens, and everyone involved enjoyed a compelling, meaningful, and moving experience."

"The best thing for me was the Haggadah," said Rabbi Yaacov Vann of the Calabasas Shul in Calabasas, California. "It is very user-friendly and is geared toward the needs of people who may not have participated in a traditional seder before."

"The NJOP leader's guide was very useful," said Rabbi Barry Gelman of United Orthodox Synagogues in Houston, where 140 people attended a seder on the second night of Passover. "It provided me with innovative ideas for explaining concepts and offered thoughts that really resonated with people."

Other synagogues were equally successful in their efforts to implement NJOP's Model Seder and Pre-Passover Workshop programs. The Model Seder program, a step-by-step tour through the Passover seder, complete with explanations, stories and songs, is based on Rabbi Buchwald's renowned Lincoln Square Synagogue Model Seder and has been a popular program for many years.

The Pre-Passover Workshop, which is new to the NJOP curriculum, was designed to enable the uninitiated to explore the larger motifs of Passover prior to attending a seder. Included in the Workshop are discussions concerning the meaning of "Passover," the Haggadah, matzah and why the seder is relevant to Jews of every age. NJOP's Pre-Passover Workshop reflects a realization that in the 21st century, most Jews have more than four questions for which they seek answers.

"It's clear that participating synagogues communicated the very important message that their doors are open and that everyone is welcome to participate in Passover Across America," said Rabbi Buchwald. "The way individuals, generations and communities connected through this beautiful program really underscores the themes of community and freedom that are so powerful during Passover. Hopefully, the connections that were made between Jews and their heritage and between rabbis and community members will produce spiritual benefits for many years to come."

Blessing the Children, Blessing Ourselves:

SAA/C 2005 introduces the Birkat HaBanim Discussion Guide

May the L-rd protect and defend you. May He always shield you from shame. May you come to be in Israel a shining name. ("Sabbath Prayer," Fiddler on the Roof)

Perhaps you recognize these words from Tevya and Golde's "Sabbath Prayer" for their five daughters in the musical *Fiddler on the Roof.* More than just a lovely song, however, the "Sabbath Prayer" is Broadway's attempt to portray *Birkat HaBanim*, the weekly Shabbat custom when Jewish parents bless their children on Friday night.

One of the most important benefits of Sabbath observance is the opportunity to celebrate "family time." Liberated from the constant interruptions of the telephone or the lure of the television, Jews around the world spend Shabbat "quality time" together. Whether with relatives or friends, or even among strangers in a new community, the Shabbat table fosters a warm family atmosphere.

As the poet/philosopher Achad Ha'ahm noted: "More than the Jews have kept Shabbat,


Shabbat has kept the Jews." But what about Shabbat has kept the Jews? Perhaps it is the love for Jewish life that is transmitted from one generation to the next through *Birkat HaBanim*, the Blessing of the Children, every Friday night.

While it is customary for parents to bless their children every week at Shabbat dinner, the *Birkat HaBanim Discussion Guide*, NJOP's newest Shabbat Across America/Canada supplemental program, focuses on the power of giving a blessing to another person. In this way, all members of every congregation, those with children and those without, are included in the theme of the program.

The Birkat HaBanim Discussion Guide, written and designed by NJOP's Sarah Rochel Hewitt, highlights four Biblical or Talmudic sources pertaining to the general theme of blessings: 'G-d's blessings to humankind,' 'People blessing people,' 'Who has the ability to bless,' and 'Blessings, not miracles.' Through the detailed discussion guide, moderators and participants at this year's SAA/C explored what it means to give a blessing to another person, as well as why the Jews use the specific text of the weekly blessing of the children.

The Birkat HaBanim Discussion Guide joins

a growing oeuvre of educational materials designed to provide synagogues with specific, pre-designed, Shabbat-centered programs for Shabbat Across America/Canada. These programs, including the *Shalom Aleichem Discussion Guide* and the *Aishet Chayil Study Guide*, as well as the *Birkat HaBanim Discussion Guide*, are available for individual purchase through NJOP.

It all began at Rabbi Buchwald's Lincoln Square Synagogue Beginners Service, which has served as the prototype for the hundreds of

services subsequently created around the world by the National Jewish Outreach Program. In a dramatic recreation, Eddie and Rabbi Buchwald

explored how a simple introduction to basic Jewish concepts, accompanied by a warm and

caring Jewish community, inspired one unaffiliated Jew to become a vital part of the Jewish people.

Young Leadership Awardees

In a fitting tribute, the Leslie Nelkin Special Service Award was stirringly presented to Batya and Eddie by Batya's father, Rabbi Shlomo Riskin, the Chief Rabbi of Efrat and Founding Rabbi of Lincoln Square Synagogue. Having witnessed the profound effects of Rabbi Buchwald's outreach efforts not only on the Lincoln Square Synagogue community, but on his own family as well, Rabbi Riskin commented: "NJOP is about angels. Any human being who helps bring about G-d's destiny in the world is ipso facto an angel. Rabbi Buchwald is an active angel who brings people into heaven even when they are still walking on earth."

Aside from the outreach "angels" that NJOP sends throughout the world, NJOP is also the beneficiary of the generosity of many angels who support the creation of new programs accompanied by innovative educational material and creative advertising--which are disseminated free of charge to hundreds of participating synagogues and Jewish centers. The annual Dinner is the perfect

venue for NJOP to recognize and pay tribute to these extraordinary donors and their commitment to NJOP's vital work.

No organization could wish for a more generous "angel" than Mr. Sam Domb. NJOP has been truly blessed to have been the recipient of his extraordinary insight, generosity and love. In a surprise tribute to Mr. Domb, Rabbi Buchwald described a scene that portrayed Mr. Domb's true nature:

"I was invited to a parlor meeting that Sam Domb held in his townhouse for the benefit of the Yeshiya

his donation
of \$100,000

Ketana--quite a
generous sum,

you must admit. But Sam Domb has his own way of giving charity. When he announced the

\$100,000 donation for Yeshiva Ketana, he said to those in attendance: 'There's another day school in our neighborhood that also needs our support. I therefore pledge an additional \$100,000 to the Manhattan Day School.' When I called the leaders of the Manhattan Day School to tell them of Sam's benevolence, they were in shock. After all, they had not expected nor solicited his money. Then Sam said, 'And Rabbi Buchwald is helping to save Jews, so I'm giving him \$100,000 as well.' It was the charitable equivalent of a hat trick, something that we rarely see. That evening, Sam Domb raised about \$450,000 for Yeshiva Ketana of Manhattan, and with those pledges in hand, the yeshiva has gone on to raise much more money on its own."

Mr. Domb's generosity is very real and very substantial. The pain he feels, not only for the catastrophes in Jewish history, but also for the current state of the Jewish people, is matched only by his boundless love for his Jewish brethren. By way of introducing this year's Guests of Honor, the Podolsky family, Mr. Domb said, "The greatest treasure that G-d gave the Jewish people is the Torah, but not every one is a

scholar of the Torah. I am not....But I am a defender of the Torah, and so are the Podolskys..."

That the Podolsky family exists today to share in the work of NJOP is, in itself, a story of survival. From the ashes of Europe, Zenek and Fanny Podolsky came to Brooklyn, rebuilt their lives and created a beautiful family with seven children. Indeed, so profound is their story of regeneration and dedication to their community, as well as their personal success, that, at the end of the evening, New York Democratic

Congressman Anthony Weiner presented them with a special Congressional

Proclamation. "History taught us a lesson," Mr. Domb declared, "that Jewish survival can only be guaranteed by us, not by anyone else. And tonight I want to tell you that Jewish survival is guaranteed by a family by the name of Podolsky.

We cannot change our yesterdays, but we sure can change our tomorrows. [With] people like the Podolsky family, there will be better tomorrows."

Better tomorrows obviously begin with the quality young leadership within the Jewish community. This year, NJOP's Young Leadership Award was presented to Eliana and Vladimir Gutin, who have a unique, almost fairytale, story. Eliana, a beautiful model from Gorky in the former Soviet Union, came to the United States and began modeling for a designer of clothing for Orthodox Jewish women. Fascinated by Jewish life, she began attending Rabbi Buchwald's Beginners Service and eventually converted to Judaism. Eliana met handsome, dashing Vlad, who was then starting his career at Goldman-Sachs, and told him in no uncertain terms that she would not marry him until he became more observant. She brought him to the Beginners Service, where he relearned the Hebrew he had forgotten since his Bar Mitzvah. Now married and blessed with two beautiful children, they are living a full and fulfilling Jewish life.

"It wasn't an easy path, for either of us. I remember reading [NJOP's] little blue Hebrew Primer late at night, practicing Adon Olam and slowly drifting off to a good night's sleep. But week after week, Rabbi Buchwald brought the service to life and, as I began to better understand the structure of the service, going to synagogue became a lot more meaningful and fun....As a movie buff, I would say that going to services without being able to read Hebrew is like watching a foreign film without subtitles and sound," remarked

As the Dinner drew to its conclusion, Rabbi Buchwald announced one final tribute. "While I am given credit for the success of NJOP," Rabbi Buchwald stated, "Beryl Levenson [Associate Director of NIOP] was there from the very start. Beryl is the true heart and soul of the National Jewish Outreach Program. Over the past 17 years...Beryl took our organization from its infancy and guided it to become one of the largest and most successful outreach organizations in the world. Time has no meaning for Beryl, she is on for the Jewish people 24/7." Rabbi Buchwald also noted that Beryl's husband Sam, an accountant, has also given of his talents to help NJOP whenever asked. After 17 years of dedication, Beryl and Sam have moved forward with their plans for Aliyah. While Beryl found people to take over some of her work, the organization is blessed to know that she will be continuing to work for NIOP from afar.


